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Minister's Musings

Back in November the NE Synod had its annual Convocation. This is a time when rostered religious leaders gather to worship, visit, relax and recharge. I understand the commitment GLC make to send me to Convocation and I truly appreciate it.

Monday night we had a discussion with Bishop Tracie Bartholomew from the NJ Synod of the ELCA. She has been, and continues to be, a strong leader in the ELCA in the areas of social justice, racial and gender equality, and God's Grace. Bishop Bartholomew talked a lot about what a Bishop does. This was helpful as we prepare to elect a new Bishop in June 2024. A Bishop is a pastor to the pastors (and LLMs). A Bishop sets policy, prays, and speaks on behalf of the synod. A Bishop does not speak for the synod or any individual church community. A Bishop has a lot of responsibility and very little authority.

Tuesday was a focus on our individual Emotional Quotient or our Emotional Intelligence (EQ-i). Prior to attending Convocation, each attendee filled out a questionnaire used to evaluate our individual EQ-i. The results were shared with us the weekend before convocation and I can tell you, mine were pretty humbling. I was beginning to worry if I was in the wrong profession until I spoke to many colleagues who were also humbled by their individual results. It might not make you feel better, but it made me feel that I was in good company. We learned strategies to improve, and I promise that I will work to be better. I cannot promise results, only a commitment to serve you better.

Tuesday afternoon was fellowship time filled with various activities including hiking, napping, running, a brewery visit, theater practice, or just some meditative alone time. The evening highlight was a Yankee swap gift exchange.

Wednesday morning, we were back in plenary sessions for various updates on the AntiRacism Board, Bishop's farewell remarks and various committee announcements. There is much going on around our NE Synod and the ELCA Churchwide.

Part of Bishop Hazelwood's comments included topics the new Bishop will need to address. One near and dear to my heart is the continuation of the Licensed Lay Ministry program. While the numbers of LLMs continue to grow (from 12 when I started to ~25 now) this program remains controversial. Some (ordained and lay members) feel that only an ordained Pastor should lead worship, others feel that lay leaders are the future of the church. Either way all the LLMs in the NE Synod serve at the invitation of the Bishop, so it is only right for Bishop Hazelwood to leave the future of the program in the hands of the new incoming Bishop.

Each day ended with worship, prayer, and meditation. I think this is the most powerful part of the program. I truly feel revived and ready to serve when I return. Thank you again for your generosity for allowing me to attend Convocation.


On its surface, the Panem Suzanne Collins introduced in the first novel of her trilogy, <u>The Hunger</u> <u>Games</u>, seems to be a world without religion. In the novel, no one is ever seen to pray, even covertly, or mention God, even in the form of an "OMG". Instead, this appears to be an entirely secular dystopian future, set in present-day United States.

Under its surface, however, the story of <u>The Hunger Games</u> is one with themes of sacrifice, love, and giving up fear. These themes are familiar to Christians, and parts of the story bring to mind the perfection of God's love for us.

In this world, the oppressor, the Capitol, rules over twelve districts. A rebellion had been attempted at one point and was violently halted. As punishment for their rebellion, every year two young people, a male and a female, from each district, are forced to compete in a bloody competition to the death. When young Primrose is conscripted for this task, her older sister Katniss volunteers to take her place. Knowing it will likely mean her death, nevertheless Katniss chooses the path of sacrifice to allow her sister a chance at life.

During the competition, Katniss and her male counterpart Peeta are advised to pretend to be in love, to ramp up the drama of the game and pull in sponsorships. Even though their romantic love is an act, at least on Katniss's part, they begin to truly love each other as friends, so much that they defy their oppressor by refusing to harm each other.

Facing an event in which every other participant has given into fear and thus violence, Katniss and Peeta chose love, thus thwarting the evil intentions of their oppressors and opening the door for further defiance of the Capitol. In the end, love pulls through and allows both these young people to live. Fear begets violence, but perfect love begets true sacrifice and breaks the rod of the oppressor.
