Stop! Do not read this column until after Good Friday!

Feel free to read the rest of the Olive Tree and come back here later. Go ahead, we'll wait.

Alleluia! Christ is Risen! - He is Risen Indeed! Alleluia!

The Easter Season is full of life and light. White and Gold are the colors of the season. White light is made up of all the colors of the rainbow (like our LBGTQ+ Flag) together. White light can represent wholeness, unity, and diversity (like our LBGTQ+ Flag). If we take away one color, the light is no longer white.

Gold represents royalty and the preciousness of our risen Christ. Gold can be represented as yellow. Both yellow and gold represent sunlight, warmth, and spirit. Yellow looks most striking next to its complementary color purple. In this way, the gold of Easter following the purple of Lent complement each season. While the two seasons (and colors) are strikingly different, they seem to complete each other nicely.

During the Easter Season our first reading will be from Acts instead of the normal Old Testament reading we get at other times. In the northern hemisphere now, Spring brings the rebirth of nature that echoes the birth of the new church in the Acts readings. It's all about growth and abundant new life in Christ.

Where Christ fills all things, we see beauty. Sometimes it's hard to see the beauty of the sacred in ordinary or difficult situations. But Christ is there. Think of ways you might see or represent Christ in difficult times as well as joyous times.

We are growing and regrowing into the body of Christ throughout the Easter Season. Think of ways we represent this growth in the greater Manchester community as well as within our Gethsemane community. Think of ways to be God's hands in God's world.

The Vigil of Easter

The Vigil of Easter begins in complete darkness as if in death and despair, and ends in the brilliant light of the Resurrection. It is a repetition of actions and gestures initiated long ages before. In the celebration of this Vigil, space is transcended: the act of remembering takes place at a grave, but the grave is anywhere the event is recalled. The church building and with it the congregation moves from darkness to light, and in the font the baptized move from death to resurrection, boldly challenging the threatening powers of darkness and death. Time is transcended.

As noted earlier, the Easter Vigil was originally a preparation for and time for baptism and the center of the rite of the Easter Vigil remains the celebration of Holy Baptism, or if no candidates, for the renewal of baptismal promises. The Apostolic Tradition of Hippolytus (ca. 215) describes the ceremony which almost certainly was developed still earlier, probably even in New Testament times:

On Friday and Saturday the catechumens and others with them fasted;
Saturday night was a vigil of prayer and instruction;
Sunday morning, at cockcrow was the rite of Baptism, followed by the Eucharist.

In keeping the Easter Vigil the church follows Christ through his suffering and death to his resurrection and new life. The Vigil of Easter consists of four parts:

Service of Light
Service of Readings
Service of Baptism
Service of Holy Communion

At the end of the Easter Vigil, culminating in the Holy Communion, the Resurrection of the Lord is at hand. Lent is over. Easter is here! Christ is risen! He is risen, indeed:

Alleluia!!





The Romero Prayer

It helps, now and then, to step back and take the long view.

The Kingdom is not only beyond our efforts; it is even beyond our vision.

We accomplish in our lifetime only a fraction of the magnificent enterprise that is God's work.

Nothing we do is complete, which is another way of saying that the kingdom always lies beyond us.

No statement says all that could be said. No prayer fully expresses our faith. No confession brings perfection. No pastoral visit brings wholeness. No program accomplishes the church's mission. No set of goals and objectives includes everything.

This is what we are about.

We plant the seeds that one day will grow. We water the seeds already planted, knowing that they hold future promise. We lay foundations that will need further development. We provide yeast that produces effects far beyond our capabilities.

We cannot do everything and there is a sense of liberation in realizing that. This enables us to do something and to do it well. It may be incomplete, but it is a beginning, a step along the way, an opportunity for the Lord's grace to enter and do the rest. We may never see the end results, but that is the difference between the master builder and the worker.

We are workers, not master builders; ministers, not messiahs.

We are prophets of a future not our own.

Oscar Romaro was an Archbishop of San Salvador known for advocating for the poor and for social justice. Archbishop Romaro became a martyr when he was assassinated on March 24, 1980.

Who: All Congregations in the New England Synod led by the NE Synod World Hunger Team!

That's a possible \$200,000 that our New England Synod can raise to help combat hunger and support the ministry of ELCA World Hunger! Please note: we are asking all congregations to send their funds through the Synod rather than directly to ELCA World Hunger so that we can have an accurate account of the money raised.
